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Definitions

- **Digital Recovery Support Services (DRSS):** PRSS services that are provided through online or telephonic platforms in lieu of face to face contact.
- **Peer Recovery Support Services (PRSS):** Social support designed and delivered by people who have experienced Substance Used Disorder and recovery. This peer-based model helps individuals engage in the recovery process and embodies a message of hope for the recovering community (SAHMSA, 2009).
- **Recovery:** a process of change through which people improve their health and wellness, live self-directed lives, and strive to reach their full potential (SAMHSA, 2020). There are four major dimensions that support recovery:
 - **Health**—overcoming or managing one's disease(s) or symptoms and making informed, healthy choices that support physical and emotional well-being.
 - **Home**—having a stable and safe place to live.
 - **Purpose**—conducting meaningful daily activities and having the independence, income, and resources to participate in society.
 - **Community**—having relationships and social networks that provide support, friendship, love, and hope.
- **Recovery Capital:** Conceptually linked to protective factors and wellness, Recovery Capital can be divided into three categories; personal, family or social and community. These categories encompass factors such as physical health, basic needs, social relationships, attitudes, policies, and other resources (W. White, W. Cloud, 2008). Recovery Capital is measured through the Brief Assessment in Recovery Capital (BARC-10) assessment tool.
- **Recovery Coaching (RC):** One-to-one mentoring wherein focus is to work with the service recipient in development and accountability with a personal Recovery Wellness Plan. Help with barrier reduction and systems navigation is also expected. Relationship is ongoing until terminated by either party.
- **Recovery Community Center (RCC):** Peer operated centers that serve as local resources of community-based recovery support and help build recovery capital among individuals and the community (Recovery Research Institute). A single Recovery Community Organization can have multiple centers.
- **Recovery Community Organization (RCO):** "An independent, non-profit organization led and governed by representatives of local communities of recovery. These organizations organize recovery-focused policy advocacy activities, carry out recovery-focused community education and outreach programs, and/or provide peer-based recovery support services" (P. Valentine, W. White, P. Taylor, 2007).
- **Telephone Recovery Support (TRS):** Weekly outgoing calls to individuals for brief check-ins on his/her/their status and progress in recovery. Referral to other resources is expected. Relationship usually lasts the length of each call, with multiple RCO representatives calling daily lists of program participants.

Project History

Harbor Care (formerly Harbor Homes) was contracted in July 2016 to serve as the Facilitating Organization (FO) for the State of New Hampshire's effort to support the sustainable and integrated development of Recovery Community Organizations (RCO) and their delivery of Peer Recovery Support Services (PRSS). RCOs and Recovery Community Centers (RCCs) were known elsewhere in the country to fill gaps in addiction treatment and recovery infrastructures and to grow numbers of people accessing vital supports to achieve and sustain long-term recovery. New Hampshire's innovation of funding a Facilitating Organization to aggressively grow a collaborative workforce of community based PRSS providers is sure to contribute to an improved system of care for people affected by addiction.

The PRSS field, though new relative to clinical disciplines and unorganized peer support fellowships, has demonstrated measurably improved outcomes for program participants before, during, after, and in lieu of traditional addiction treatment services. Dramatic outcomes are demonstrated in New Hampshire by way of personal accounts and the beginnings of measurable outcome data through use of new peer friendly data platforms.

In summer 2016, the FO completed an environmental scan to identify grassroots organizations' preparation for accreditation by the Council on Accreditation of Peer Recovery Support Services (CAPRSS). Those organizations

deemed "most ready" for CAPRSS accreditation were subcontracted under the FO. In September 2016, the FO subcontracted three organizations in three different Public Health Regions, providing those organizations with technical and operational support, start-up funding, and monthly reimbursement-based funding after the first two months. Two additional organizations were subcontracted in December 2016; two between January and May 2017, two were subcontracted in July 2018, one in March 2020, and two additional centers in March of 2021 to position FO-supported RCOs in ten of the state's thirteen Public Health Regions. The FO continues to identify and work with multiple organizations and grassroots efforts to continue to expand quality peer recovery support services in underserved areas of the state.

FY21 Project Summary

Harbor Care was contracted to complete an environmental scan in the state of New Hampshire to identify the readiness of Peer Recovery Support Services (PRSS) based on standards set forth by the Council on Accreditation of Peer Recovery Support Services (CAPRSS) in Recovery Community Organizations (RCO). Upon completion of the readiness scan, we will continue to develop infrastructure and provide program support to NH RCOs through the following actions:

- Subcontract with 13 existing RCCs in at least 9 Public Health Regions.
- Subcontract with two new RCCs located in underserved regions that do not having existing centers.

- Provide a minimum of 82,000 RCO generated services.
- Assure each RCO meets or exceeds CAPRSS accreditation standards.
- Provide technical assistance, compliance monitoring, and data quality assurance for all subcontractors.
- Provide technical assistance to contracted RCOs to enroll in Medicaid upon the establishment of a Peer Recovery Program provider type by the New Hampshire Medicaid Program based on Federal Center for Medicaid and Medicare Services (CMS) and other federal and state requirements.
- Determine the RCOs ability to establish a recovery center.
- Provide technical assistance and trainings to subcontractors as needed including but not limited to capacity development, quality improvement, administrative support, organizational coaching, compliance monitoring, and data quality assurance.
- Assist subcontractors with ongoing back-office functions as needed (HR, financial, billing, IT, grant writing etc.).
- Encourage communication and cooperation among RCOs through a "community of practice".
- Assist RCOs to engage with Regional Public Health Network (RPHN) continuum of care development work and local mental health peer support agencies (MHPS).
- Develop workplans with each subcontractor and monitor progress on goals including funding and sustainability, PRSS service development, CAPRSS, Medicaid, data collection, and staff development.
- Assist subcontractors in developing sustainability plans and applying for appropriate funding.
- Promote PRSS throughout the state by managing the NH Recovery Hub Facebook Page, developing and distributing an e-newsletter, and presenting in meetings and workshops.

Impact of COVID-19 Pandemic

COVID-19, a coronavirus, causes respiratory illness in varying degrees of severity. In early 2019 this virus spread across the globe and reached every corner of the United States. Governor Chris Sununu declared a State of Emergency on March 13, 2020, following the World Health Organizations declaration of COVID-19 reaching pandemic status and in response to the increasing number of cases within New Hampshire. The State of Emergency orders required the closure of all non-essential businesses and encouraged people to stay at home. On March 18, 2020, Governor Sununu released his 8th emergency order allowing for the expansion of telehealth services through "all modes of telehealth".

In response to the Governor's State of Emergency, RCOs closed their doors to the public. All workers were allowed to work from home and provided digital peer recovery support services primarily over the phone or through video conferencing platforms such as Zoom. COVID-19 required RCOs to adapt very quickly and explore the realm of digital recovery support services. As a result, many centers have expanded their reach and community for online support meetings and recovery groups and are working to sustain that method of service delivery in the future. SOS Recovery Community Organization has capitalized on this unique circumstance by partnering with RCOs from other states to provide digital recovery support groups. These support groups now engage people in recovery across the country.

RCOs slowly started to reopen in the first half of FY21 following strict guidelines and recommendations from the Department of Health and Human Services, the State of New Hampshire, and The Center for Disease Control and Prevention. The FO facilitated weekly meetings sharing updates on COVID related protocols and best practices to ensure public safety. NH began distributing COVID-19 vaccines in December 2020 for first responders and high-risk medical staff. RCO staff were considered non-emergent health care workers under phase 1B and were permitted to get vaccinated as of February 2021. Now that vaccines are readily available to all adults and many COVID protocols have been lifted or significantly reduced, RCOs have started to transition back to normal operations as of May 2021.

Funding Breakdown

The FO currently manages two different contracts: PRSS FO and SORII. The PRSS FO contract is overseen by the NH Department of Health and Human Service (DHHS), Bureau of Drug and Alcohol Services (BDAS) and currently provides funding to fifteen RCCs. The SORII contract provides funding from the Substance Abuse and

Mental Health Association (SAMHSA) through the NH DHHS and helps support thirteen RCCs. There are currently eight RCCs that receive funding through both contracts.

PRSS FO

The PRSS FO contract was originally awarded to Harbor Care in July 2016 and serves as the primary source of funding and technical assistance for fifteen out of twenty subcontracted RCCs. This funding provides support for grass roots organizations to help sustain peer recovery support services provided at each organization. The funding sources that comprise this contract include 11% general funds, 22% federal funds and 67% other funds according to public record on Governor and Executive Council Agenda on June 16, 2021, item #15.

SORII

The SORII contract is a combination of the PRSS Community Contract and the Parenting Education contract from prior fiscal years. The former Parenting Education contract (now funded through SORII) was awarded to Harbor Care in November 2018. This contract was awarded to RCOs to support evidence informed family programming for parents in recovery. As of June 2020, seven RCOs are offering Parenting Journey in Recovery (formerly Sober Parenting Journey). Parenting Journey in Recovery is a 14-week, strength-based curriculum that supports healthy relationship building for parents in recovery from substance use disorder. Free family style meals, complimentary childcare, and transportation to and from the 14-week group is offered at no cost for all participants. The former PRSS Community contract (now funded through SORII) was originally awarded to Harbor Care in September 2019. This funding source provides support to ten RCOs for various recovery programming with the overarching goal to expand the delivery of new and existing peer recovery support services throughout NH. This funding not only supports five brand new RCCs but also aids in the expansion of various programming including local transportation services and recovery coach dispatch services to emergency departments. The SORII contract is comprised of 100% federal funds according to public record on Governor and Executive Council Agenda on January 22, 2021, item #21.

The chart below depicts all twenty of the RCCs and the percent that each state contract managed by the FO contributes to their overall FO budgets. *Please note that these two funding sources managed by the FO might not account for 100% of the RCO's total budget. RCOs also have independent grants and funding revenues not managed by the FO that are not accounted for in this report.*

Medicaid Reimbursement

The FO attended multiple webinars and Q&A sessions with NH Department of Health and Human Services and Program Integrity regarding policies and procedures for RCOs to bill Medicaid for reimbursement. An RCO Billing Manual was developed and approved by DHHS that summarizes the relative He-W 513 SUD provider rules for subcontracted RCOs to reference as they each work towards eligibility for Medicaid reimbursement. Subcontracted RCOs are supported by the FO and Harbor Care throughout this entire process including applying for Medicaid IDs, contracting with individual Managed Care Organizations, and providing monthly billing reports for each eligible RCO. There are currently nine RCOs actively billing Medicaid. They have collectively accumulated \$327,575.23 in Medicaid reimbursement funds. The table below details each RCO, their current Medicaid billing status, and their annual reimbursement amount.

FY 2021 Highlights

- Harbor Care continues to subcontract with seven RCOs to provide Parenting Journey in Recovery through SORII funding.
- Harbor Care subcontracted with two new RCCs Addiction Recovery Coalition of NH in Milford and Capital Area RCO in Concord.
- Harbor Care continues to help update information on <u>NH Recovery Hub</u> in partnership with BDAS.
- Harbor Care continues to provide Community of Practice trainings quarterly with Technical Assistance being provided by Growth Partners.
- Harbor Care regularly attends the LADC Board, Recovery Task Force, and Governor's Commission on Alcohol and Other Drug meetings.
- Harbor Care is collaborating with Growth Partners to establish a consistent and unbiased way to determine if RCOs meet CAPRSS standards.
- Harbor Care released an e-newsletter every quarter known as the <u>Recovery Fix</u>.
- Eight organizations have now received CAPRSS accreditation.
- Harbor Care continues to provide updated procedures, training, and TA for data input into RecoveryLink.
- Harbor Care continues to provide up to date information and best practice recommendations to all subcontracted RCOs relative to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Harbor Care coordinated or facilitated 38 RCO trainings totaling 192 hours and 695 participants.
- Harbor Care engaged in 922 activities regarding RCO training, program development, site visits, outreach, or TA.
- Harbor Care facilitates a biweekly meeting for all RCO Directors to discuss program and contract updates.
- Two of Harbor Care staff completed Project Management Professional training.
- One Harbor Care staff completed a Leadership Development Program.
- FO staff are active members of Harbor Care's QA/QI and Emergency Preparedness work groups.
- Harbor Care hosted multiple trainings on racial diversity/inclusion and cultural competency in partnership with Deo Mwano.
- Partnered with Main Stay Technologies to provide organizational assessments and trainings to aid RCOs in meeting Exhibit K requirements.
- Harbor Care offered TA and organizational coaching to the state of Maine's network of RCOs.
- Harbor Care offered support and TA to North Suffolk Mental Health in Boston, MA as they transitioned to RecoveryLink's data platform.
- Harbor Care implemented a new training software, MedTrainer, to ensure all RCO staff complete required trainings.
- Harbor Care meets regularly with NH DHHS, BDAS, and Arkansas Foundation for Medical Care (AFMC) to develop and formal evaluation plan to evaluate NH PRSS and associated outcomes.
- Harbor Care, NH DHHS, BDAS, and AFMC are in collaboration to create a public facing dashboard displaying aggregate service numbers.
- Harbor Care conducted 41 site visits for individualized TA to subcontracted recovery community organizations. *Note: this number does not include any TA provided over Zoom or other digital platforms.*
- Harbor Care provided back-office services and technical assistance to all RCOs.
- Harbor Care successfully transferred all subcontracted RCOs onto new data platform, RecoveryLink.
- Harbor Care created and distributed guidance documents and templates that aligned with RecoveryLink metrics.
- Harbor Care continues to support RCO's in Medicaid applications and MCO applications, 11 RCOs are fully credentialed and are ready to bill.

- Harbor Care worked with MCOs, East Coast Reimbursement, and NH DHHS to finalize billing procedures for RCOs. Nine RCOs are regularly billing Medicaid and received reimbursements totaling \$327,575.23 for the fiscal year.

Accreditation

To date, eight of the subcontracted RCOs are accredited through the Council on Accreditation of Peer Recovery Support Services (CAPRSS), a program of Faces & Voices of Recovery. SOS Recovery Community Organization, which had been assessed as 'most ready' for accreditation during our initial RCO scan in 2016, received an Exemplary five-year accreditation status in June 2018. Navigating Recovery of the Lakes Region and Safe Harbor received Standard three-year accreditation status in early 2019. Greater Tilton Area Family Resource Center, Keene Serenity Center, and White Horse Recovery Center all received CAPRSS accreditation during fiscal year 2020. Hope for NH Recovery, who was previously accredited by CAPRSS in 2016 for a five-year accreditation, joined the Facilitating Organization as a subcontractor during the second half of fiscal year 2020. Revive Recovery Center received their 3-year accreditation in January 2021.

CAPRSS's accreditation measures include four core areas of standards (Principles, People, Practices, Performance) and thirty domains that are assessed by the RCOs themselves and through a peer review process. The four core areas of standards in the CAPRSS accreditation process – Principles, People, Practices, and Performance – refer to the mission, vision, and code of ethics that a center follows; the participants served by the center and the community the center is in; the way that the centers go about helping their participants and benefit the overall community; and the data showing that the centers are performing at the highest level – both through fiscal responsibility and overall outcomes for participants.

Together with Growth Partners, a third-party organization that provides technical assistance to non-profits, the FO began to develop a process to ensure NH RCOs meet CAPRSS standards without requiring the organizations to go through the formal and expensive accreditation process. The FO's five-step process includes organizational development, a desk review, site visit, findings report with accreditation status, and reassessment. During organizational development, RCOs will attend regular one-on-one meetings with FO staff to assist with preparing for the review. The center staff will be given opportunities to ask questions and have FO staff review documents informally prior to the desk review. After the center has indicated that they are ready for the desk review, we will review all relevant and required documentation from the centers to ensure that the centers' policies, procedures, and financials meet CAPRSS standards. Using information collected in the desk review, the FO will then develop a site visit agenda that is tailored to each center based upon the findings in previous steps. During the site visit, the center staff, board members, volunteers, and some participants will be interviewed about organizational policies and procedures. Based upon the findings of the desk review and site visit, the FO will score the organization, which will determine whether they meet or exceed CAPRSS standards. If so, the organization will be granted either a 3 or 5 year "accreditation" status before the standards are reassessed. The FO will provide a report to the organization with a summary of findings and recommendations. If a center is found to not meet standards, they are provided with recommendations and a period of six months to address necessary changes before the FO conducts a new desk review and site visit.

Each RCO is engaged in the accreditation process at an appropriate stage relative to its organizational capacity and maturity in developing, delivering, and documenting PRSS. Of the remaining RCOs that are not currently accredited, we expect the North Country Serenity Center and Mount Washington Valley Supports Recovery will be ready to receive their accreditation in fiscal year 2022. The FO provides monthly meetings with recovery centers to provide support and technical assistance as they prepare their organization for their assessment of accreditation standards.

Participant Services

PRSS as they are defined for purposes of potential Medicaid billing are exclusive to individual or group Recovery Coaching and continuous recovery monitoring. However, PRSS as delivered by NH RCOs include a broad array of services, including police-assisted recovery response programs; housing and other basic needs assistance; treatment/health systems navigation; inter/intraorganizational group facilitation; homeless outreach; hospital and emergency department response; transportation; services delivered to family members; community outreach and education through the form of presentations and community events, adventure outings, naloxone training and distribution, etc. RCOs utilize the various engagement types in RecoveryLink to record these different services including follow up engagements, brief check ins, care coordination, referrals, contact logs, and activity logs. *In FY21 FO funded RCOs provided services to 190,223 individuals* through follow up engagements, brief check ins, care coordination, referrals, contact logs, and activity logs. *In FY21 FO funded RCOs provided services to 190,223 individuals* through follow up engagements, brief check ins, care coordination, referrals, contact logs, and activity logs. Participant Outcomes

RecoveryLink offers three primary methods of collecting outcome metrics from participants receiving PRSS: intake, Brief Assessment of Recovery Capital (BARC-10), and the participant outcomes form. **Outcome data is analyzed using both SORII and FO funded RCO data.*

1. The full intake collects a variety of key metrics including but not limited to substance use, employment, education, housing stability, referral source, income, insurance coverage, substance use disorder treatment episodes, and primary care. The full intake is completed when there is interest in receiving recovery support services with an assigned coach. This initial intake serves as a baseline for the collected metrics. As the participant continues to engage in services the intake is updated. Any changes to these metrics are tracked and reported as an average overall change percentage. For example, is a participant initially came in and identified as unemployed during their intake, but after engagement with their coach they found part time employment, their employment status change from unemployed to employed part time would contribute to a positive change percentage.

In FY21 there were measurable changes in key demographics and recovery characteristics including but not limited to housing, employment, personal income, and SUD prescription medications

2. The BARC-10 is an assessment of recovery capital measured on a scale from 10-60. Recovery capital is the measure of internal and external assets that can be utilized by recoverees to initiate and sustain recovery (Cloud & Grandfield, 2008). The initial Assessment of Recovery Capital (ARC) identified 10 primary domains (substance use and sobriety, global psychological health, global physical health, citizenship and community involvement, social support, meaningful activities, housing and safety, risk-taking, coping and life functioning, and recovery experience) across 50 questions (Groshkova, Best & White, 2013). The BARC-10 was derived from the initial ARC tool to assess each domain for a total of 10 questions. This brief assessment tool is used to evaluate recovery support services and their effectiveness on recovery related outcomes, inform recovery support providers' service delivery, and provide a strength-based measurement of progress for the recoveree. It is recommended that this assessment be used at intake and a minimum of one month during ongoing service engagement.

In FY21 there was a statistically significant improvement in recovery capital for participants who were engaged in peer support. There was a larger increase in recovery capital for those participants engaged in comprehensive recovery support services i.e. engaged in both recovery coaching and telephone recovery support services.

3. The participant outcomes form is collected monthly for participants enrolled in recovery coaching and/or telephone recovery support. It collects and tracks progress of outcomes related to social connectedness, retention, quality of life, perception of care, and associated negative health events.

In FY21 there were measurable decreases in negative health events such as recurrence of substance use and behavioral health related emergency room visits for participants engaged in peer support. 78.7% rated their quality of life as good or very good. 80.3% rated their satisfaction with self as either satisfied or very satisfied. 68% rated their physical health as either good or very good. 66.6% rated their mental health as either good or very good.

Back Office Support

Harbor Care, as the FO, is obligated to provide a variety of supportive functions including back-office support. This ensures that small grass root and non-profit organizations have the resources needed to operate. The FO offers a wide range of back office and technical assistance (TA) including but not limited to organizational coaching, capacity development, administrative support, data collection and evaluation, and quality improvement that can vary based on the individual RCO's needs. The chart below depicts different back-office support and TA functions that the FO regularly provides and whether it is utilized by each RCO (indicated by an "X").

Training

Sustainability

Each RCO has been successful in leveraging FO funds for service contracts and grants which expand their scope of work. A Majority of subcontracted RCO's receive additional funding for a variety of programs including but not limited to recovery coaching in the emergency department, probation and parole relationships, Recovery Friendly Workplace initiatives, homeless outreach, etc. All RCO's are in close working relationships with their regional Doorways. However, most RCOs still face capacity issues related to their expanded roles in their communities.

Sustainability needs will become clear once regular and consistent service reimbursements are received from Medicaid MCOs. The FO will work individually with all RCOs to establish and maintain their unique sustainability plans with their individual revenue streams and programming. A majority of RCOs are just starting the detailed process of sustainability planning for their programs. Harbor Care predicts that sustainability planning will be a primary focus of TA and training needs for the upcoming fiscal year.

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
